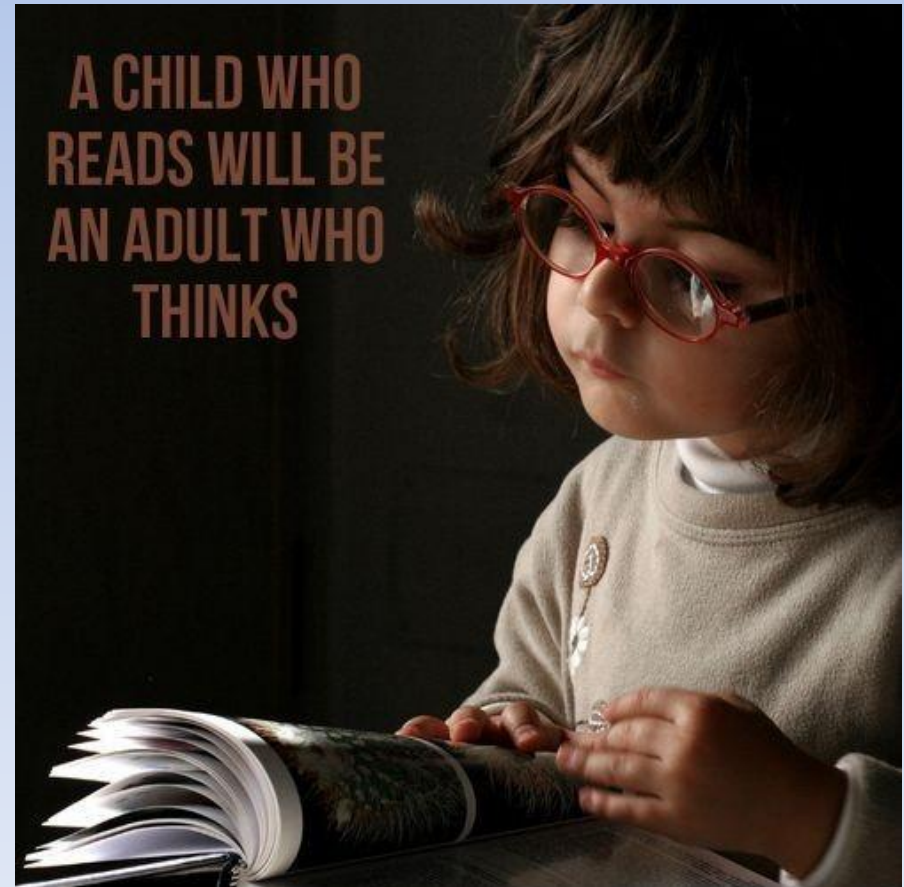
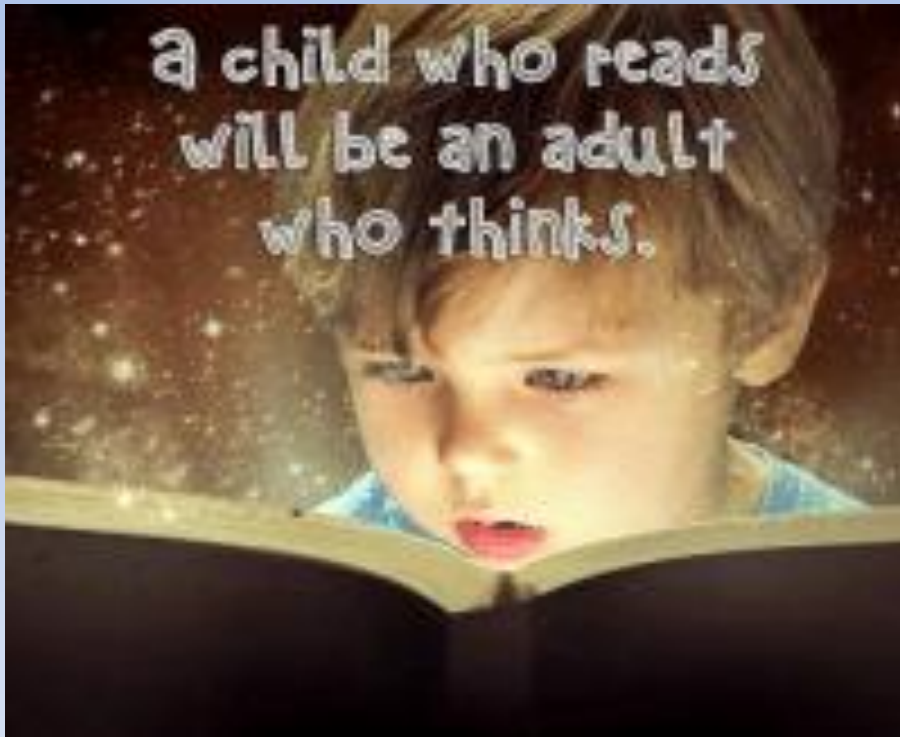


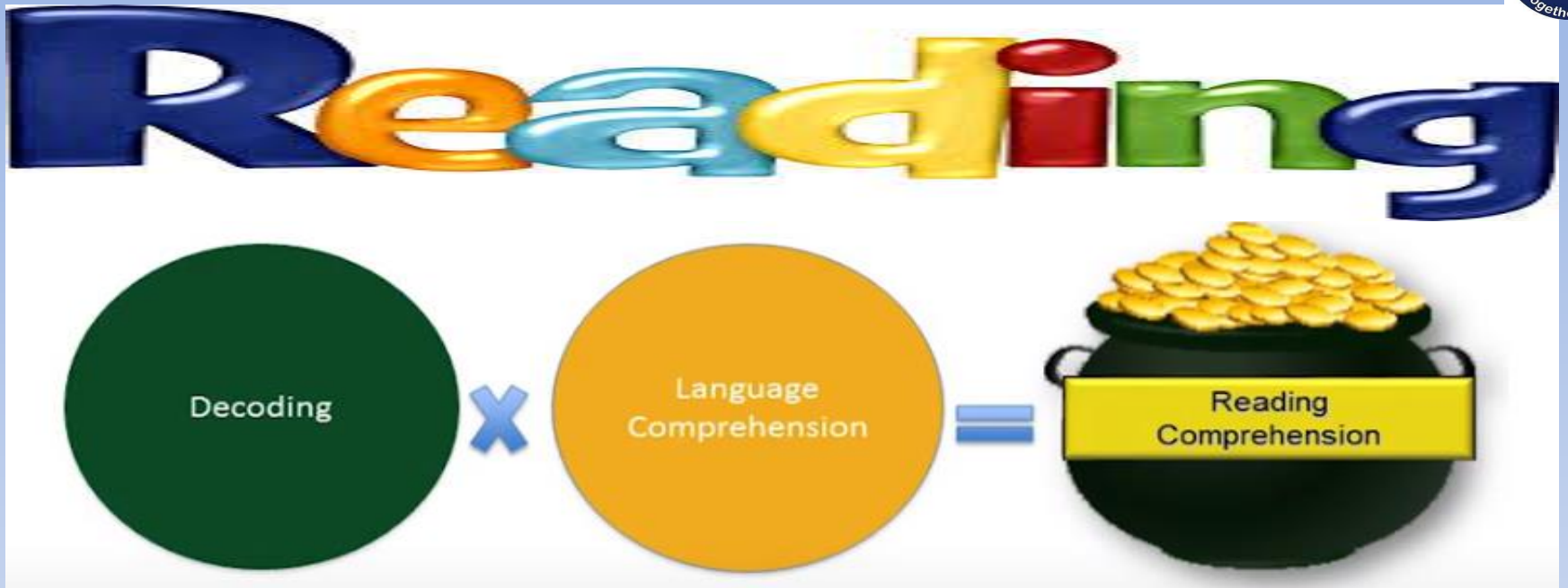

Decoding: breaking down parts of a word by phoneme and blending these together to read the whole word.

Language comprehension: being able to read a section or an entire piece of text and understand its meaning. To make sense of a text, the reader draws on background knowledge, vocabulary, grammatical understanding and their ability to make inferences about meaning based on these.

Reading to Kids: The “Million-Word Gap”



THE MILLION WORD GAP

New research shows the different numbers of words kids will have heard by age 5 based on how often parents read to them:

Never read to: 4,662 words

1-2 times per week: 63,570 words

3-5 times per week: 169,520 words

Daily: 296,660 words

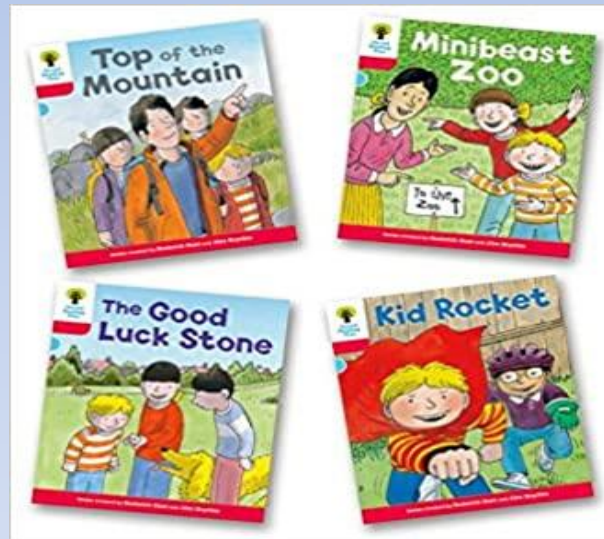
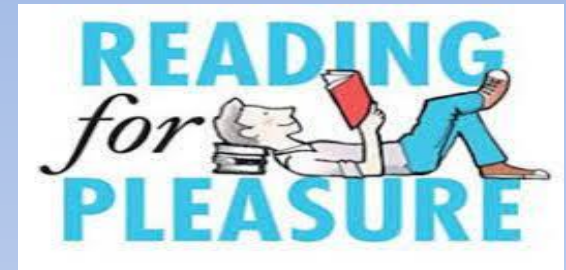
Five books a day: 1,483,300 words

Phonics?

'Read, Write Inc.' is a literacy programme by Ruth Miskin.

A complete literacy programme - systematic and structured.

Meets the demands of the new national curriculum, giving your children the best chance of success in the national tests.

One-to-one tutoring - no child is left behind.

Storybooks align with the sounds learnt in class and therefore the children are consolidating the phonics they have learnt and applying these skills in context.

A bit of technical vocabulary...

Phoneme - spoken sounds - there are about 44 in the English language

Grapheme - how we write each of the spoken sounds e.g. the spoken sounds 'f' is written using the graphemes f, ff, ph.

Red words - words that cannot be sounded out e.g. I, said, they

Green words - words that can be sounded out using our phonics

Fred talk - (Fred is the frog) he can only talk in sounds e.g. sh-o-p

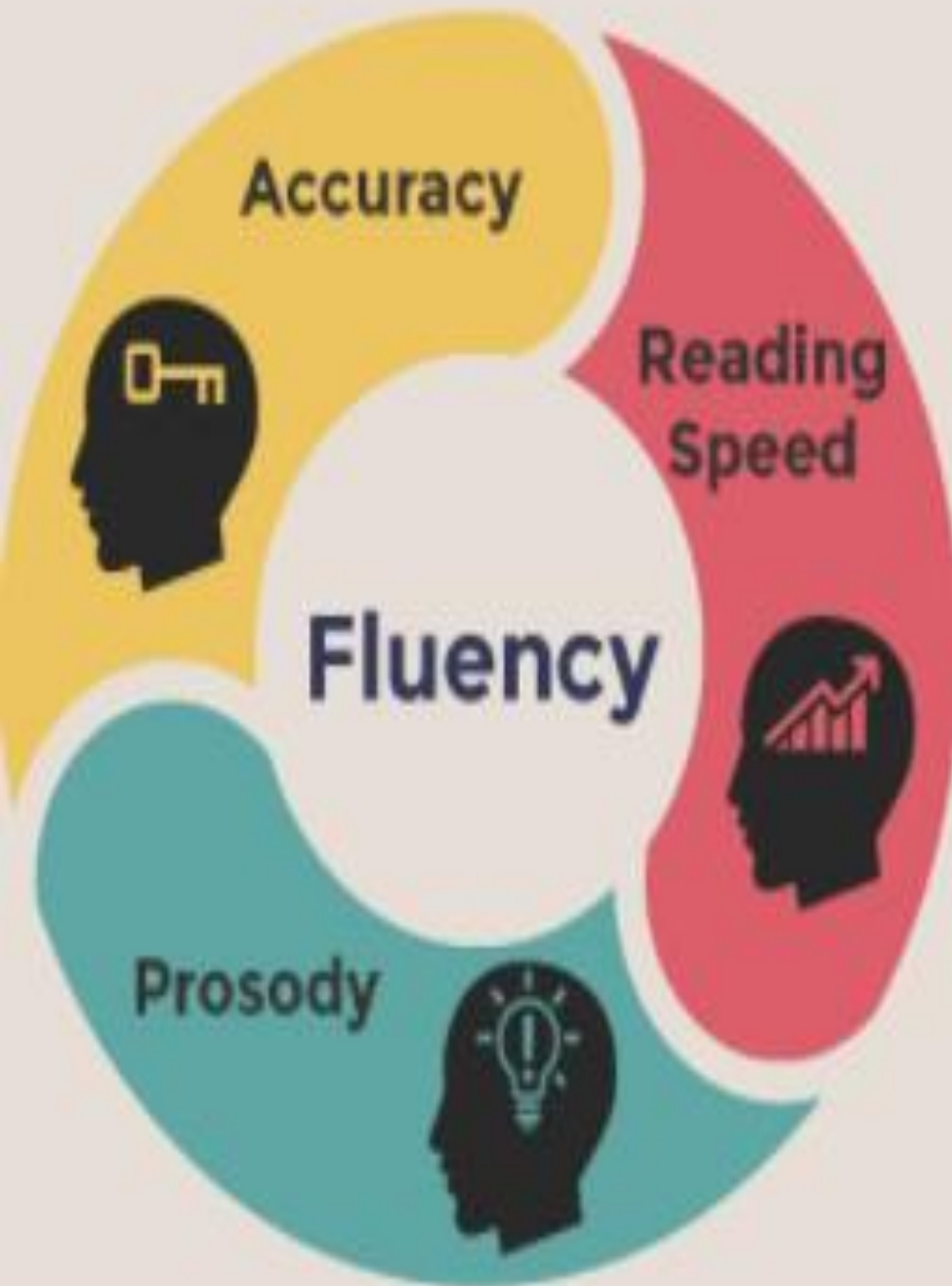

Prosody

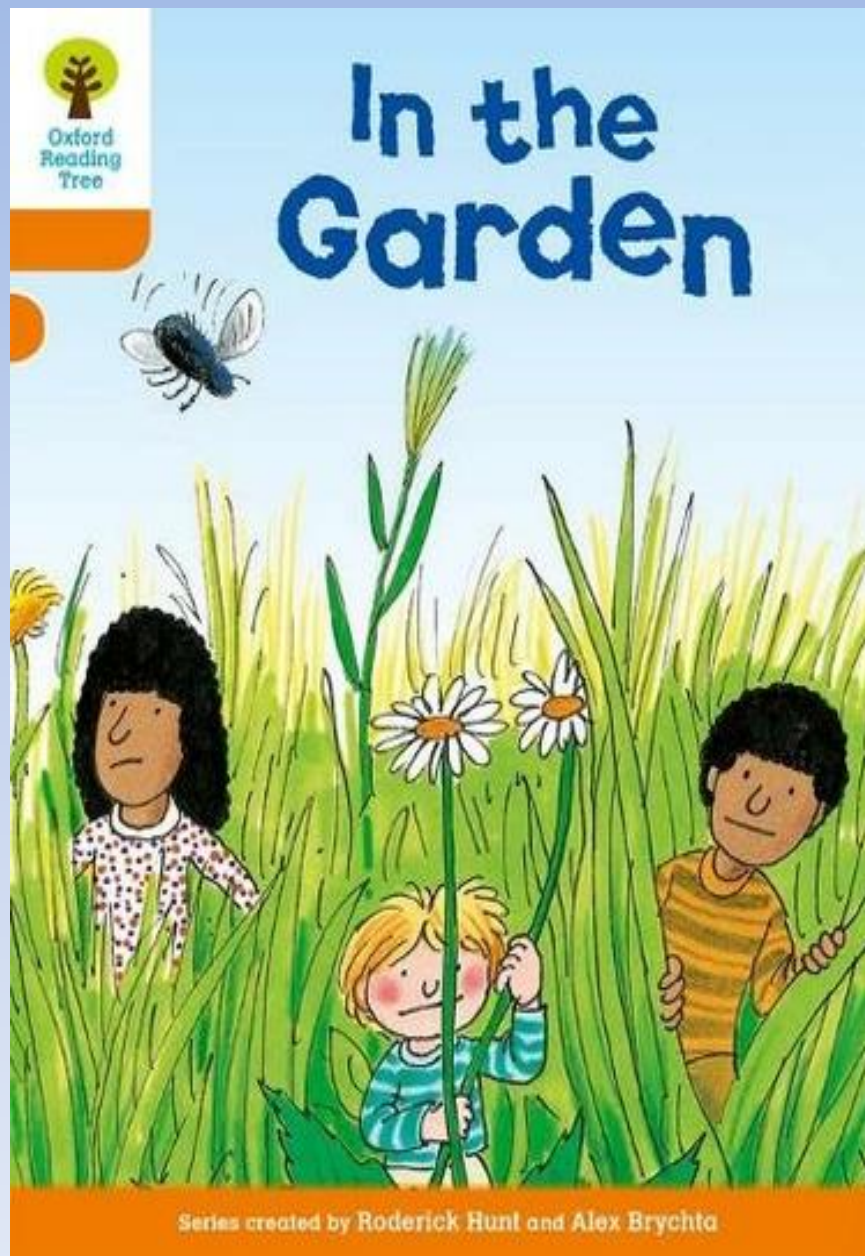
The skill of reading aloud with proper intonation, phrasing, and expression.

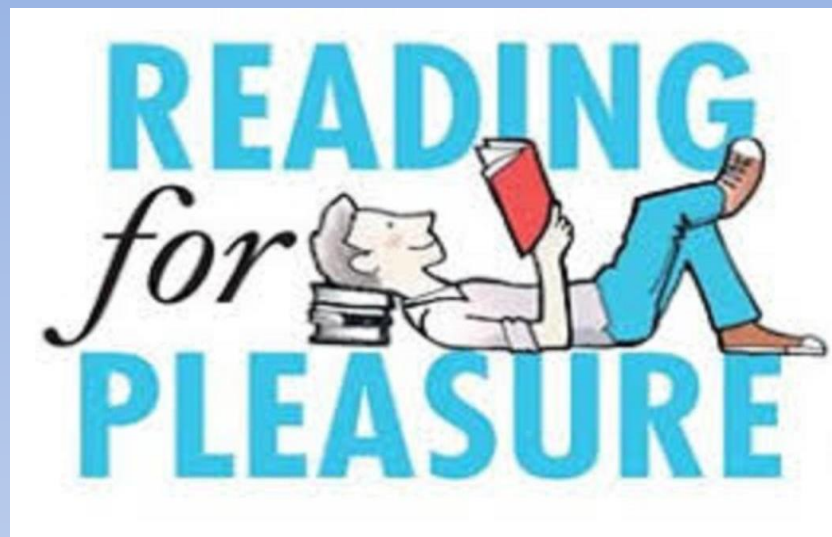
